Two hundred thirty three Kiwanis ladies and juniors representing 88 clubs of California-Nevada District enjoyed very successful 23rd annual convention at Boston. Total registration 4,128. Rice, Oakland, California; Ben Dean, Grand Rapids, Michigan. Dr. Charles B. Holman, St. Louis, Missouri, and Dan Wentworth, Chicago, Illinois.
