#### EDITORIAL

### THE DEVELOPMENT OF KIWANIS' UNITED STATES -CANADA GOOD WILL WEEK PROGRAM

In 1921 at the Cleveland convention, the first "Canadian Day" celebration, the forerunner of the present "United States-Canada Good Will Week" was observed. The next year, 1922, the week of April 2-8 was officially fixed as the period during which "Canadian and United States Days" were to be observed, and a bulletin issued at that time states that "This period was selected because it was in April 1818 that the negotiations between Great Britain and the United States were finally completed in the Rush-Bagot Agreement."

The International Board provided in July 1926 for the appointment of a Special International Committee to have charge of plans for a wide observance of this feature of Kiwanis, with the adoption of the name "United States-Canada Week" rather than "Days." This proved generally acceptable, and was in effect until June, 1936, when the Board again changed the title to that of "United States-Canada Good Will Week," and the same has been maintained since that time. The date of the observance of this program is during the week in which occurs the anniversary of the signing of the Rush-Bagot Agreement, April 28 and 29, 1817.

The purpose of the observance has always been the same as that proposed and adopted in the original resolution at the Cleveland convention in 1921 which was, "That every effort be made to foster by all means the continued splendid relations between the United States and Canada . . . .'
