



KIWANIS TO AID WORLD PEACE WITH CHARTER DAY PROGRAM

In line with the resolution providing for a United Nations Charter Day Program, adopted at the International Council meeting last month, all clubs are urged to organize a community-wide program or forum during the month of August to help create a strong and insistent public opinion which will demand a lasting peace.

The Charter Day Program will serve to present to Kiwanis communities the purport and principal provisions of the Peace Charter in order that everyone may be familiar with the document, express an opinion, and have a voice in how world-wide peace and security are to be maintained.

In a recent public affairs bulletin of the California-Nevada District it is pointed out that ratification of the charter will not be a guarantee of world peace. District officers are of the opinion that it should be the burning desire of every public affairs committee to see that its clubs actively studies, learns and works for this accord.

Wealth From the Sea

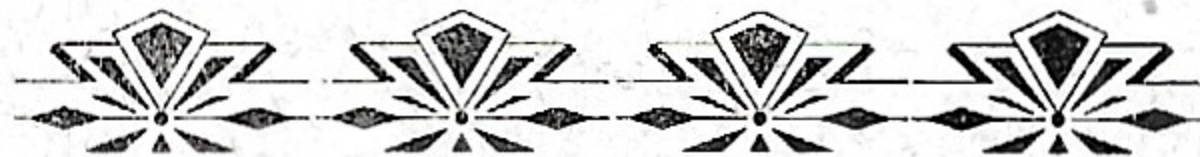

HERE'S WAY TO FLY

UNITED NATIONS FLAG

In cooperation with representatives of 44 United Nations, a flag code has been worked out and a World-Wide Reference Guide published setting forth the following regulations for displaying the United Nations Honor Flag:


1. Honor flag must not be displayed alone—always with national emblem.
2. Never in number one position of honor—always secondary.
3. When flown from same flag-pole it should be smaller in size.
4. When flown beside a national flag it is to be the same size and at the same height.
5. No flag other than national should be flown above or to the right of United Nations Flag unless so specified by the flag code of a particular country.
6. On a special day paying honor to a personage of some Allied country, the flag of his country is given second place for the occasion. The Honor Flag then takes third position.
