GENERAL INFORMATION

The Institute of World Affairs is a self-supporting, non-profit, educational enterprise conducted by San Diego State Colloge as a public service. All contributions made to its support will be returned to the public in the form of educational service in the promotion of a better understanding of public issues and problems, local, national and international.

Admission: Institute sessions are regularly open only to members of the Public Service Bureau of the San Diego State College Foundation and to students who have registered in Term I or Term II of the College Summer Session (The Sunday evening session is open to the general public without charge). Membership in the Public Service Bureau is available to the general public upon the payment of \$2.00 for regular membership, \$10.00 for contributing membership and \$25.00 for supporting membership.

A certificate of membership in the Public Service Bureau of the San Diego State College Foundation entitles the holder to admission to all sessions of the Institute of World Affairs and to all appropriate events under the direction of the Bureau in the college year 1945-46. The program planned by the Bureau is made possible at a nominal regular membership fee by substantial contributions from other sources. A certificate of membership or a student body membership card must be shown at the door for admission to all sessions of the Institute, except the Sunday evening session.

SIX RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY 1945 COUNCIL, URGE CHARTER SUPPORT, CONTINUE WAR AID

Resolutions calling upon Kiwanis Internation to continue its all-out support of the war, to develop a United Nations Charter Day Program, and to seek to maintain the close relationship that exists between the United States and Canada were adopted by the 1945 International Council at Chicago in June.

Past International President A. Copeland Callen, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, served as chairman of the committee on resolutions.

The six resolutions adopted by the Council follow:

Resolution No. 1

WHEREAS, The culmination of one of the major phases of the World War in which the United States and Canada are involved and the transfer of numbers of our armed forces to new and more distant areas of operations may affect those who are called upon to serve here at home with a sense of loss of momentum and remoteness from our ultimate objective; and

WHEREAS, The issues of which the war was undertaken are not yet fully and finally settled,

BE IT RESOLVED, That this Council confer upon our incoming Board of Trustees and our administrative officers a further mandate to utilize the abilities and the entire resources of Kiwanis International in supporting, maintaining and prosecuting the general war effort to a decisive and successful conclusion.
