## Our "fiscal" year

The fiscal year of our club is from January 1st, 1945 to December 31st, 1945 and all bills recently rendered cover this period of time. This information is in response to several requests about the period of time covered by the statement sent.

### OCEAN BEACH

A "Home Planners Institute" for Ocean Beach was proposed by E. W. Meise, superintendent of domestic electrical sales for the San Diego Gas & Electric Co. to the Kiwanis club at the meeting of Tuesday evening. He also spoke on the new improved electrical devices most likely to be available to homes here in the not distant post-war period. He was introduced by Frank F. Swan, program chairman for the evening.

The institute runs once a week for 10 weeks, with experts from each industry representing all the various items that go into the purchase, building and equipping of both new and remodeled homes, giving the lectures, Meise stated. The instruction and advice given, much of it of a professional character, is free to those attending the institute, he said. Among the subjects handled are:

"Why plan now?; selecting your homeseite; building laws; designing your house; protecting your investment; planning a modern kitchen; financing the home; landscaping and outdoor living; building materials; insulating and weather conditioning; heating and ventilating; plumbing installation and fixtures; post-war home appliances; lighting; better wiring for better living; home furnishings; and color in the home and

in interior decoration."

Meise suggested that Monday evening was now open and could be obtained by Ocean Beach for the 10 evenings. This institute is really a school for adults and is put on with the cooperation of the adult education set-up of the public schools, he said.

The speaker prefaced his remarks with a peek into the future of improved electrical appliances, predicting that after the war we shall soon see frequency modulation for radios, television, the walkie-talkie, the radio recordio for recording the voice, the electric blanket for the bed, new refrigeration units for the home, and the electrostatic air cleaner.

Home building, he said, should go a long ways toward providing the jobs necessary for the 80 per cent of new resident workers in San Diego who have indicated that they would like to remain in this area after the war. The late Walter Cooper, City Manager, had estimated that 15,000 new homes would be needed in the immediate post-war period in San Diego.
