



Kiwanis International Resolutions Adopted at the Convention in Cleveland

1. Reaffirmation

Through the years the delegates at the annual conventions of Kiwanis International have expressed the views of the organization on matters of lasting importance. The significance of these matters is as great in 1955 as when resolutions thereon were adopted and it seems unnecessary to reword such resolutions to indicate the continuing support of Kiwanis International:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Kiwanis International at this 40th annual convention reaffirm its abiding interest in and active support of the following:

1. The strengthening of the home, church and school.
2. Programs for the mental, spiritual and physical development of our youth.
3. Safety programs on the highway, in the home, in industry and on the farm.
4. Citizenship responsibility.
5. Conservation and development of our natural resources.
6. The principles upon which the United Nations is founded.
7. The free enterprise system.
8. Mutual respect and responsibility in labor-management relations.

2. The Declaration of Independence of Man

In our time, as in all times, the bright forces of freedom contend with the dark forces of slavery for the allegiance of mankind.

In the second half of our century democracy leads the forces of freedom, and communism leads the forces of slavery.

In this struggle we who fight for democracy will not neglect our physical defenses nor fail to counter all aggressive and subversive works of communism.

But we must not forget the nature of this struggle: It is for the minds and souls of men.

If our strategy is only negative, we shall fail; for communism is negation.

If we stake our fate on weapons and science, on the whole armory of materialism alone, we shall fail; for communism is a materialism.

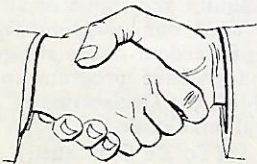
Noteworthy are the achievements of two of our players: Martin Frazier sank the longest putt on the 18th green, and Bill McNamara was credited with the longest drive of the day.

Attendance Violations Can Be a Grave Matter

Violation of the attendance rules of Kiwanis can be a serious matter resulting in suspension for members who are chronic absentees.

Below is a re-print of the Club By-Laws relating to delinquency in attendance or in payment of dues:

ARTICLE V. DISCIPLINE Dues

Section 1. Any active, reserve, or privileged member being two (2) months in arrears in the payment of dues shall, at the direction of the Board of Directors, stand suspended and shall be so notified in writing by the Secretary. Such member upon payment of arrears and upon making application for reinstatement to the Board of Directors, may, by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the entire Board of Directors, be reinstated within thirty (30) days. In case such member be not so reinstated within thirty (30) days, he shall be dropped from the membership and shall be so notified in writing by the Secretary.

Attendance

Sec. 2. Any active or reserve member who shall be absent without excuse from four (4) successive meetings or from forty per cent (40%) of the meetings during either half of the club year, shall at the direction of the Board of Directors, stand suspended and shall be so notified in writing by the Secretary. Such member upon making application for reinstatement to the Board of Directors, may, by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the entire Board of Directors, be reinstated within thirty (30) days. In case such member shall not be reinstated within thirty (30) days, he shall be automatically dropped from the membership and shall be so notified in writing by the Secretary.
