This desk found a resting place early Monday morning, in fact as soon as the Tidings was delivered at the office of one of our members.

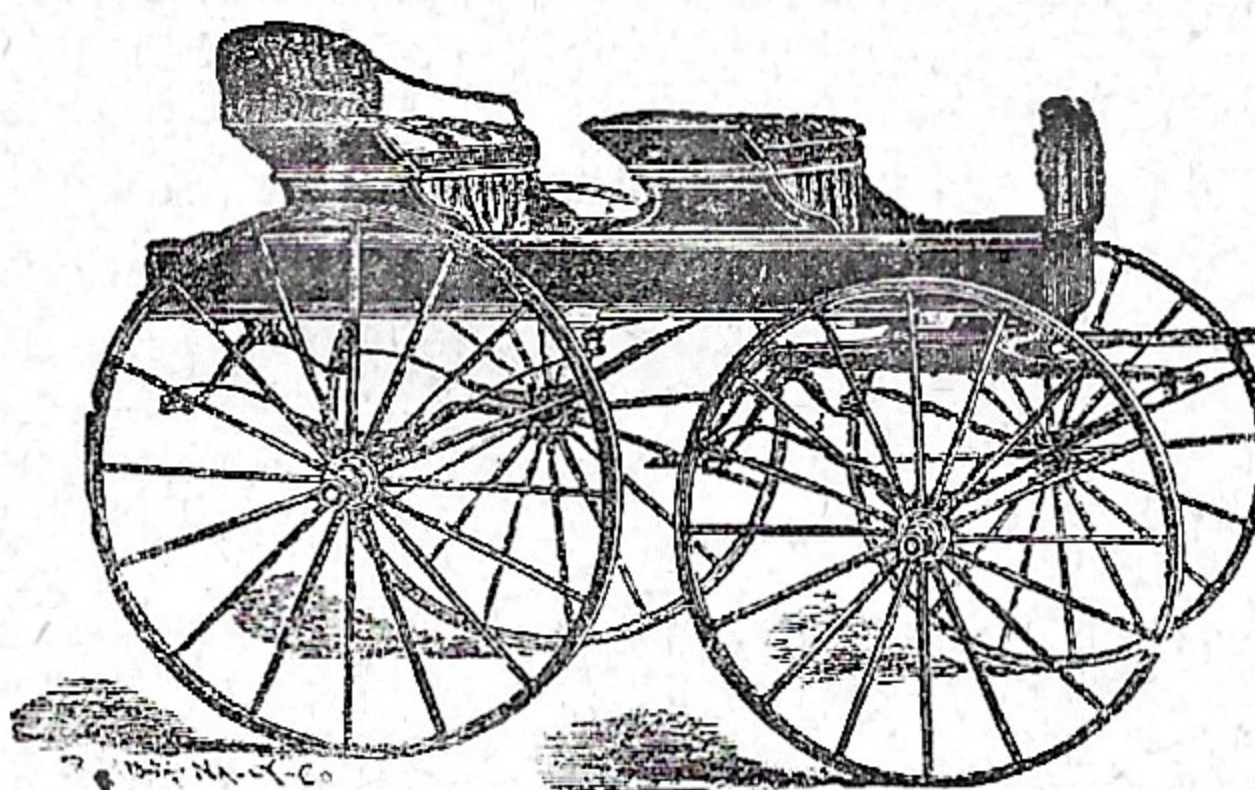
