Important New Plan for All Kiwanis Members

In 1954, all Kiwanis Clubs in the Calif.-Nevada-Hawaii District began participating in a new plan to improve reporting procedures for Monthly Achievement Reports with each Club to be given a monthly grade in the "Club Action Ranking Plan."

It is important that all members, and especially Committee Chairmen, be familiar with the scoring plan as presented be'ow. It is now IMPERATIVE that ALL CHAIRMEN submit written monthly reports not later than the third day of each month.

Failure to do so will penalize the Club in receiving a proper score. Here is the Club Action Scoring Plan:
