OCEAN BEACH

"Dick" Barbour guest speaker

Not much improvement in child delinquency can be expected in San Diego until the mothers are back in the home instead of in war pants, Dr. Richmond Barbour, director of guidance in the San Diego public school system told the Ocean Beach Kiwanis Club Tuesday evening. His topic was, "Problems of the Growing Child in a Growing San Diego." Bob Sharon was pro-

gram chairman.

Though the number of arrests for child delinquency has not particularly increased here and though truancy from school is on the decline, school discipline is getting more and more difficult and there is a doubling of stammering in preschool age children indicating increase in emotionally upset children, Barbour declared. He listed the following as the seven conditions that contribute most to child delinquency here:

- 1. Absence of mothers from the home.
- 2. Lack of a father in the home.
- 3. Loss of normal home restraints.
- 4. Lack of community recreational facilities.
- 5. Too much money in the children's pockets.
- 6. Large numbers of unattached uniformed males.
- 7. Racial conflicts.

While it is difficult to provide much remedy for the situation as long as the war is on, the speaker suggested that more recreational facilities, more activity on the part of the character building agencies, particularly the Boy Scouts and the Girls Scouts, better teen-age centers and improvements in the activities of the public authorities.

Barbour also was somewhat pessimistic about the first few years immediately following the war. He said that children born during the war are not getting the normal home training that they should have and as a result will mean more child delinquency. He predicted, however, that as our homes return to normal living we will see a gradual decrease in such delinquency.

Visitors at the meeting were Walter Krames of the San Diego Club and Bob Fuller and Andy Anderson of the La Mesa Club.

Father Phil Harris will be program chairman for next week's meeting.

Geoffrey Morgan gives informative talk.

Geoffrey Morgan again gave us a good talk and rather opened our eyes to the need of the future for more Air Fields to handle the postwar air transportation.

He called attention to the fact that aviation is controlled and limited by airports of which there are far too few at present throughout the United States to adequately handle the future needs in this direction.

With runways in some instances two miles long, the larger cities are preparing NOW for the inevitable in this field of transportation and our own limitations will be dependent upon our airfields and facilities.

His comment that out of 1827 American cities that are qualified for airports, only 286 have constructed them.

Much has been learned about flying in recent years through our forced education in the battle zones and this of course will be a large factor in the flying of the future when thousands of individuals will have had the air experience which will enable them to use the skyways for airways.
