#### KATE SMITH SALUTES KIWANIANS, CLUBS IN NATIONAL BROADCAST

In a stirring tribute over the nation-wide facilities of the Columbia Broadcasting System, Kate Smith commended Kiwanians of the United States and Canada for their wartime activities during 1944.

The songbird of the air, who conducts one of America's most popular 15-minute daytime shows, devoted several minutes to a description of Kiwanis International, its 2,250 clubs, its ideals, projects and 1945 administrative theme.

She pointed out that Kiwanians last year bought and sold war bonds valued at \$1,000,000,000, collected more than 600,000 tons of scrap, donated 50,000 pints of blood, sent millions of cigarettes to the overseas armed forces, and kept in touch with some 2,000,000 servicemen and women by letter and the mailing of hometown newspapers.

The fines collected last Tuesday amounted to quite a neat sum of money, which of course will be put to good use in the Child Welfare work so all members who did NOT bring their ladies helped this fund in no small manner. It would seem from a count of money collected that about thirty-four members were negligent or remiss in their duties, so what? One dollar each man, that was the answer.


