**CLUBS TO SALUTE
 STATIONS, NETWORKS
 FOR WAR SERVICE**

Kiwanis clubs in America and Canadian cities having broadcasting stations will pay tribute to the radio industry during the week of May 13 to 19, Donald T. Forsythe, chairman of the International Committee on Public Relations, announced following the February meeting of the board of trustees.

Mr. Forsythe, pointing out that the radio industry this year is commemorating its 25th anniversary, lauded stations and networks for "the magnificent job they have done in the war." At the same time, he added, "they have rendered great service to the community."

Kiwanis Radio Week will be fashioned after National Newspaper Week, which Kiwanians have been observing annually for several years. A detailed program now is being prepared by the General Office and will be issued shortly to all clubs in cities having radio stations. A plaque, a certificate or some other testimonial, designed for presentation to radio executives, will be made available to clubs.

"We urge your wholehearted cooperation in this proposed project," Chairman Forsythe stated, "inasmuch as the radio stands for free speech, a higher standard of living, an educated and enlightened people, and community service."

Expressing the hope that at the end of this war Jerusalem may be chaplain of the Bishop School at La Jolla, concluded his address before the local Kiwanis club Tuesday evening.

This week being "Holy Week," he appropriately used that title for his talk and gave first hand information about the observance of "Holy Week" in Jerusalem as he observed it on a trip there in 1937. He spent the entire week in the Holy City and took part in the religious observance of the week there, starting with the devotionals held on Palm Sunday and ending with the services conducted on Easter Sunday.

These various services, he said, were conducted at sites in and around Jerusalem made famous by Jesus 19 centuries ago. Most archaeologists agree that the sites as now used for the "Holy Week" services are authentic, he stated. "My visit there made these momentous events in religious history more real to me," he said.

Father Philip Harris of the local Episcopal Church was the program chairman.
