OCEAN BEACH

Ocean Beach Kiwanis club has completed four months in succession with the high record of 100 percent attendance, Chairman W. B. Oster of the attendance committee, announced at the meeting Tuesday evening. He also was program chairman for the evening, and a program in observance of Health Education week was put on.

In the role of speaker was Dr. Gerald A. Heidbreder of San Diego, who is connected with the Public Health Service. He spoke on the control of communicable disease, with emphasis on rheumatic fever and its effect on the heart. Illustrating his subject he showed three films, the three being on heart disease, tuberculosis and malaria.

Replying to the rather frequent question being asked as to the possible transmission of tropical diseases brought home by servicemen serving in the Pacific Islands, the speaker stated that "to a large extent tropical diseases require tropical insect transmitters and since such insects are not a pest in this country the problem should not prove a serious one."

In controlling communicable diseases the six factors must be kept in mind. He said they were the following musts:

1. Must be a causative agent.
2. A reservoir of the particular causative agent.
3. A mode of escape from the reservoir.
4. A method of transmission.
5. A mode of entry into the human body.
6. A susceptible host.

Control can be achieved, he said, by attack on any one or on all of these factors.
