Kiwanis Foundation Scholarships

The San Diego Kiwanis Club (you fellows), through the agency of your Kiwanis Foundation are now the donors of two modest scholarships. The project was ap-

proved in principle by the Board of Directors several months ago. A special committee headed by Past President Herb Peiffer recommended the criteria and conditions to govern the awards. The Board adopted the committee report, recommended it to the Foundation Board of Trustees, who in turn accepted it and approved the allotment of funds. The scholarships will be awarded as follows:

(a) one to a graduating student of San Diego High School and one of Lincoln High School, who are eligible for and enrolled as undergraduates at San Diego State College.

(b) Recipients will be selected on the basis of (1) Scholarship, (2) Leadership Potential and (3) Need.

(c) Selection will be by the faculty scholarship committees of the schools concerned, on the basis of (b) above, and without discrimination as to race, creed or color.

(d) Upon notification by the school authorities of the selections, and notification from the Registrar of State College that the candidates are enrolled, the scholarship funds will be deposited with the College for credit to the students' accounts for tuition, fees, books, etc., at the rate of \$50 at the beginning of each semester.

It is our hope that by means of this program our club may be instrumental in encouraging some brilliant student who might otherwise go no further than high school to go on and fill the ever-increasing Program

"THE TRANSISTOR STORY"

Speaker of the Day

PAUL W. TOMLINSON

of the Pacific Telephone Co.

The role of a dime-sized electronic device in the future of communications will be discussed and demonstrated.

The transistor, composed of bits of crystalline germanium, already is used in many fields of electronics although it was developed less than seven years ago. Destined to replace vacuum tubes in many applications, it can perform nearly any task of the vacuum tube but requires much less power—as low as one millionth of a watt. It is sturdier, doesn't radiate heat nor require a warm-up period. Tests indicate the device can be expected to operate for 40 years or more.

Using the miniature device, Mr. Tomlinson will show how it can boost an electric signal several thousand times and thus prove of special value in hearing aids, miniature radios and telephone work.
