THE OCEAN BEACH

Both Dr. Alfred Sand and L. L. Bloomenshine, the speakers Tuesday evening at the Kiwanis club meeting, agreed that headway toward international peace has been made by the World Conference at San Francisco and at the other international meetings and conferences that preceded the one now in session in the city at the Golden Gate.

Dr. Sand reviewed the conference that led up to the one at San Francisco and declared his belief that it might be well to "play ball" with Russia, As a matter of fact, he said, Russia can't afford another war in the next 50 years and is likely more interested in the success of the World Conference now in session than any other nation.

Mr. Bloomenshine, who is principal of Point Loma high school, reviewed the achievements at the San Francisco Conference to date and said in conclusion that he was prone to agree with Comdr. Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota governor, who is one of the outstanding members of the U. S. delegation, that the present World Conference is a "beachhead on the way to peace and that out of the conference peace eventually will emerge."

"Of interest is the fact that the framework of the Dumbarton Oaks proposals thus far have been maintained by and large at San Francisco and with few important changes," the speaker declared.

Next week's meeting will be in charge of the committee that has the "support for churches" project of the Kiwanis Club.


