C. V. Schools to Honor Memory of R. L. Mueller

Chula Vista City School District will honor the memory of the late Robert Lawrence Mueller by naming a school after him.

The Robert L. Mueller Elementary School is now under construction in Chula Vista.

Funeral services were conducted last Tuesday at Benbough Mortuary. He was 72 and is survived by his widow, Louise; a son, Robert L., Jr.; a sister, Mrs. Louise Miller; and three grandchildren.

Action by the Chula Vista Schools to honor Bob was taken several months prior to his death and was in recognition of his great service to the Board of Education there for over a quarter of a century. He was President of the Board.

Bob was a Past President of this Club (1928) and was a Past Lieutenant Governor (1944). He also served the Club as Secretary-Treasurer for some 15 years. The Club newspaper, the "Tidings," was first printed by Bob, and he edited it for many years.

Probably his greatest pleasure in Kiwanis was at Christmas time when he annually served as Santa Claus at the Christmas Party for crippled children.

It is doubtful if anyone was ever more fully imbued with the spirit of Kiwanis, with a constant desire to be helpful to others, and with a kindlier regard for his fellow man that was Bob Mueller. His influence and guidance in developing this Kiwanis Club over the past 32 years is second to none. He was a great Kiwanian, a good friend.

It is fitting and proper that his achievements for good shall be remembered in the naming of the Robert Lawrence Mueller school in Chula Vista.

Death Ends Long Battle By Parky Parkinson



The death of our member, Gaylord B. Parkinson, 58, last Wednesday, ended a long and courageous battle he waged against inevitable defeat by leukemia.

A member of the Club since 1947, "Parky" (the name he preferred with his friends) served the club for three years as a member of the Board of Directors, and as chairman of a number of committees.

Parky came here in 1926 from Michigan and was one of San Diego's outstanding realtors. He was a graduate of Northwestern University and a member of Al Bahr Shrine. He was a member of the executive committee of the Army Advisory Committee. During World War I he served as a captain in the infantry. He was a life member of the San Diego Club.

Parky's activity in the face of the inevitable, in getting out and mixing with his friends and maintaining a cheerful attitude toward the life that was left to him is a test that is demanded of few men. He met it with exemplary courage that should serve as an inspiration to all who knew him.
