September 19, 1955

EDITORIAL

"DEARLY BOUGHT LESSON"

Experience, says an ancient maxim, is a dear teacher, but fools will learn no other way.

That's the way Britain has learned about socialism, but the important thing is that it has learned. The lesson really may be worth the cost, and especially if its effect is felt in the rest of the free world.

Socialism long has caught at men's fancy. The theory burned as a bright flame before the eyes of the unwary and

the visionary.

Cut out profit, the theory said. Let government own everything. Make government responsible for the daily welfare of its citizens or subjects. Let industry and business carry on toward the goal of the greatest good for the greatest number.

Britain's Labor Party long has carried the ball for this idea. Ten years ago it thought it had kicked a field goal, but it soon discovered it had created one gosh-awful mess. It set out to distribute the fruits of the country's economic activity and it soon had little but the shadow of want to distribute.

Laborites probably were greatly relieved when the Conservatives returned to power in 1951, though they haven't exactly said so. The Conservatives set about unscrambling the egg, and they have done so well that Britain now is one of the world's bright economic spots. In doing this they have demonstrated that freedom really works.

And what has this to do with Kiwanis? Probably very little. Not immediate and direct, anyway. But San Diego Kiwanians are men who stand weekly and pledge allegiance to a nation which has stood for freedom. Most Kiwanians live under systems which thrive because of free enterprise. And Kiwanians look happily upon fellow humans who are earning and enjoying the blessings the earth is supposed to yield.

Driving Your Child To School

You may help our San Diego County community effort to keep the streets free of child-pedestrian accidents by reminding yourself and your children of the ways toward safe thinking and safe living. These

are the things you can do when you drive your child to school:

- 1. Have your child sit well back in the seat to insure his safety in the event of sudden stops.
- 2. Have the doors of the car closed tightly and locked: see that he does not play with door handles.
- 3. Have more than ordinary caution when approaching your school: your child may be one of the pedestrians
- 4. Designate a location where you let him out and pick him up each day
- 5. Have this prearranged spot be on the school side of the street ONLY: do not permit him to cross mid-block or from between parked cars.
- 6. Have respect for all traffic laws and school regulations: their observance contributes to your child's safety.
