University Courses offered

Start September 17

Practical English

A course in practical English, covering the contents of the freshman English without the readings and literature, to be started by the University Extension, University of California, Monday, Sept. 17, at 7 p.m. at the Kelsey-Jenney School, 1060 C Street, San Diego, will be of particular value to business people.

Dr. Frederic C. Osenburg, the instructor, is planning to give class drills and review on common errors in grammar and a basis for better expression and pronunciation.

Creative Writing

Creative writing classes will also be among the fall offerings of the University Extension. These classes too will be under the direction of Dr. Osenburg. There will be both an advanced and a beginning class, and for those who are uncertain as to which group they should join, Dr. Osenburg will hold pre-class conferences Monday afternoon and evening, September 10, in room 409 Scripps Bldg.

Personal and Industrial Psychology

Personnel and Industrial Psychology will be the subject of a class to be conducted by Dr. Robert Loken starting Thursday, September 20, at 7 p.m., in room 200, YMCA. Discussions will include

such subjects as: Psychological problems involved in labor turnover, interviews and recommendations; construction and use of aptitude and personality tests.

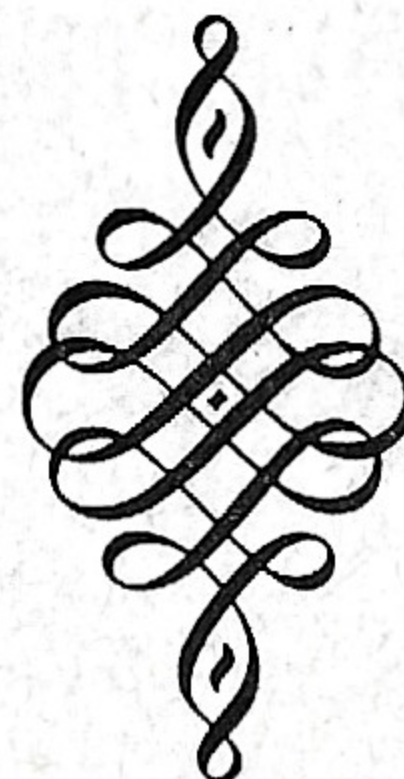
City and Regional Planning

Glenn A. Rick, assistant city manager and planning consultant, City of San Diego, will instruct a course in City and Regional Planning. Classes will start September 20 and will meet each Thursday evening thereafter in room 202, YMCA, for a total of 15 meetings.

Other Courses

Other classes to be started this fall in San Diego include: Structural steel design, counseling veterans for selective placement in industry, Chinese art and civilization, income tax procedure, educational and vocational guidance, mental hygiene, and elementary and conversational Spanish.
